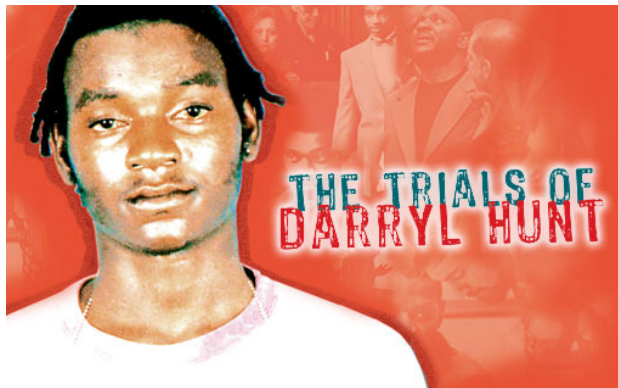

APDA proudly presents, as a Special CLE Event for Monday's opening plenary session, a cinematic production that brought a story of injustice to the big screen.



This award-winning documentary investigates a brutal rape/murder case and a wrongly convicted man, Darryl Hunt, imprisoned nearly 20 years for a crime he did not commit. At once a social justice story, a decades-long courtroom drama, and a personally driven narrative, the film follows this capital case from 1984 through 2004 via exclusive footage from two decades. The film frames the judicial and emotional response to a chilling crime - and the implications that reverberated from Hunt's conviction - against a backdrop of class and racial bias in the South and in the American criminal justice system.

SIXTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE INFORMATION

ATTIRE **No suits, no ties, no sport jackets.** After five years of temperatures in the mid-110s, there's no sense in saying that it may be hot. It will be hot. Even if wearing a suit doesn't make you hot.....please don't wear them.....it makes the rest of us feel hot just looking at you. Wingtips might get you thrown out and ties are completely uncalled for. This is a professional conference but the attire is unequivocally casual. Shorts are good. Hawaiian shirts are perfect. This being said, the air conditioning is turned up full blast due to the open doors and the number of people present, so most of the classrooms are sub-artic. If just reading this makes you cold, you may want to bring a parka, or at least additional layers to keep warm.

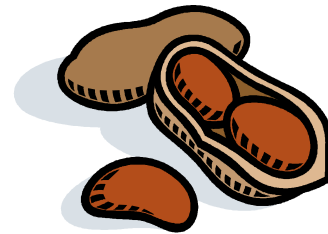

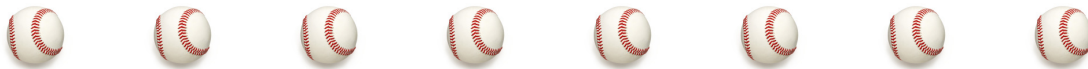
