Anatomy of a Hoax/The Duke Lacrosse Case



The Duke Lacrosse Case prosecution unfolded before the country in a "perfect storm" of race, class and gender. At the beginning, and based upon hours of commentary by the District Attorney, the country assumed that three members of the Duke Lacrosse team beat and raped an African-American college student hired to dance nude at a team party. Months later the public learned that one of the indicted players had an alibi that made it impossible for him to have committed the crime, that the District Attorney had suppressed DNA results that undermined his case, and that the accuser had changed her story repeatedly and in an apparent attempt to avoid the alibi. The State Bar of North Carolina eventually filed ethics charges against the District Attorney, forcing him off of the case. The Attorney-General, after an exhaustive investigation, determined that the three players were innocent and that no rape or sexual assault occurred. The District Attorney was stripped of his law license and sentenced to a day in jail for criminal contempt of court. "Anatomy of a Hoax" describes the evidence that led to the unraveling of this prosecution and the exoneration of the three wrongly-charged players. Jim Cooney, Joe Cheshire and Wade Smith each represented one of the three charged players and will describe the evidence, the steps they took to present the evidence to the courts and to the public, and the lessons to be learned from this case.




